Solar stories...

We recently visited former fistula patient Chifundo (35) in the Zomba district of Malawi. She is one of six former patients in the area taking part in our Solar Station project.

Chifundo received her solar unit in 2018 after her successful fistula operation. She is using it to charge mobile phones in her village providing her with a regular income. Any surplus income is used to buy crops for herself and to sell on to others. As well as being an entrepreneur and farmer she is also raising 10 ducks.

Chifundo and her business were affected by the drought that hit most parts of the Southern region of Malawi but she is hopeful things are at last improving. After the recent harvest she is expected to have 40 bags of 90 kg rice to sell.



Chifundo, like many of our other patients in Zomba, faces hardship and challenges due to extreme poverty and the rural location. However, the solar units are helping them become independent women in business and the hub of the community.

"I know this lady personally. She comes from my home village. Fistula negatively affected her life for years. She couldn't go farming like normal people do, she couldn't associate with the community because she was always wet and had to change all the time. Her life became miserable. I visited her at the hospital and she couldn't believe how she got transformed. The surgery went so well, nothing close to her fears of a complicated surgery. She was so thankful of the care that she received from the medical staff and the special care and attention she got from Dr Ennet Chipungu specifically. Bravo to you Ennet and team! You have no idea how many lives you have touched. Thank you Freedom from Fistula for giving these ladies back the life they had lost."

The AWC runs a support program for teenage mothers in our maternity unit, supported by the Aminata Maternal Foundation with events like the #AMFwalk4mums. The 'Dream Team' program provides wraparound help to vulnerable and destitute teenagers before, during and after childbirth. In addition to support from a dedicated counselor, the Dream Team girls attend classes in health education and how to look after their babies, as well as literacy and numeracy and support to return to school.
